THE HEART OF MULTICULTURALISM IN VOCATION MINISTRY

The Heart of Multiculturalism explores differences in cultural values, attitudes, perceptions of power, and communication dynamics in culturally diverse settings. This workshop will address the intercultural competencies necessary for effective vocation ministry in today's diverse Church and Religious Communities. Drawing on Scripture and the Church's teachings related to inculturation, this workshop will address some of the challenges faced by vocation ministers and the skills needed to effectively promote vocations.

This institutional collaboration innovatively meets the growing needs of Spanish speaking seminarians, religious, and other leaders who will minister in the U.S. Similarly, its

programs foster the cultural and language competencies required for English speakers who want to effectively minister in today's culturally diverse Church. Dr. Chávez was once a seminarian and a religious in temporary vows before responding to his present vocation as a married, lay minister – serving the Church in the intellectual formation of future priests, deacons, and lay leaders. BEHAVIORAL ASSESSMENT I

This workshop presents practical interviewing techniques housed in a theoretical framework of behavioral assessment. While the focus of the workshop is on initial assessment of candidates, the methodology easily applies to assessing candidates in other stages of formation as well. Workshop participants study sample case reports, and learn skills for interviewing as well as guidelines for organizing the information into useful reports. Interview topics include: family background, educational and occupational histories, psychosexual histories and intimacy skills, faith history, and other pertinent issues related to comprehensive vocational assessment.

This workshop is designed for vocation and formation ministers, seminary personnel, admissions team members and congregational leaders.

In special commemoration of the Year of Faith VOCATION MINISTRY AND THE NEW EVANGELIZATION WITH YOUTH AND EMERGING ADULTS: TRENDS, ISSUES, AND BEST PRACTICES

Creating a culture of discipleship is as essential to vocation ministry as it is to the new evange-lization. In celebration of the Year of Faith, NRVC is offering this seminal workshop which will feature three professionals treating the topic of the new evangelization and its implications for vocation ministry with and among the millennial generation. Approaching the subject from their own expertise, each presenter will offer trends, skills, issues and best practices for credible and proficient vocation ministry in three individual, day long workshops.

Dr. Robert McCarty, D. Min., will present Engagement: a Ministerial Paradigm for the New Evangelization. Pastoral ministry with young people and the faith life of our faith communities has been greatly affected by the postmodern context and societal shifts. This session will provide an overview of recent research on engaged faith communities, describe characteristics of millennial spirituality, and identify practical strategies for fostering engagement among youth and young adults. Participants will also grapple with the challenge of being Church as they identify elements of a new map for effectively calling young people to holiness, discipleship, and hopefully, religious life.

Mr. Ted Miles will present Mission and Solidarity: Re-Imaging Service Learning to Engaging

Faith in the World. In recent decades, increasing integration of justice education and service learning have inspired young people to participate in great acts of service, even to the point of influencing their vocation and career. The research and experience help us to understand that it is one thing to immerse young people in direct service and social action; it is quite another to foster within them a vision of and commitment to mission, vocation and solidarity. These core principles have helped us to understand the elements of service and justice education that are transformational: to understand service and justice as rooted in our call to authentic, Christ-centered discipleship; to walk with those whose stories and



histories are different from our own; to reflect on those encounters under the light of Scripture and Catholic Social Teaching; and to empower further response that opens a path to ongoing conversion, transformation, and vocation discernment.

Sister Lynn M. Levo, CSJ, Ph.D. will present *Life in the New Digital Ecosystem: Implications for Vocations and Religious Life*. This presentation will explore how the new media ecology is impacting the life and learning of young people today. Utilizing information from the Pew studies and understanding the realities of life for many in this digital age (e.g., media and gadgets as essential parts of everyday life, time allocation is different, the notion of presence has radically changed), we will explore the implications for living a healthy balanced life, for living a moral life and for healthy integrated sexuality—all necessary and desired elements for future religious.

This workshop is intended for all vocation ministers, vocation teams, and those seeking ongoing education in ministering to and with youth and emerging adults.

Bob has a BS in Sociology/Theology from St. Joseph University, an MA in Religious Education from LaSalle University and a Doctorate of Ministry from the Graduate Theological Foundation in Indiana. Bob is adjunct faculty at St. John University Collegeville, MN and at Washington Theological Union, Washing-

ton DC. Bob has been in professional youth ministry since 1973, serving in parish, diocesan, and community programs. Prior to coming to the NFCYM, Bob ministered in the Archdioceses of Philadelphia and Baltimore. He is the author of many resources for Catholic youth ministry and provides training programs and presentations on ministry skills and issues internationally.



Mr. Ted Miles is a native of Baltimore, MD and has worked for Catholic Relief Services since 2005 as the Relationship Manager for Religious Education and coordinator of the agency's youth outreach in the U.S. Ted earned a BA in Psychology from Loyola University in Baltimore and an MA in Psychology from Psychology from Bucknell University. His Jesuit influence led to a two year Jesuit Volunteer position in education and youth ministry in Belize

and Guatalmala. Ted has served in parish youth ministry, social ministry, and Catholic high school education and faith formation for over 25 years. For his commitment to and with young people, the National Federation for Catholic Youth Ministry awarded Ted national recognition for leadership in youth ministry in the area of gospel values of peace and justice in 2009.
